### French Binational Teachers Professional Learning

At the end of last term, our French Binational teachers were involved in marking the Year 9 (troisieme) French Diplome National du Brevet des Colléges formal exams.



As this diploma is internationally recognised, the marking is very rigorous and the same marking guides need to be developed and used by all AEFE (French ministry accredited) schools. Our teachers worked with teachers in real time across South East Asia and Australia, videoconferencing to develop the marking guides.

They then marked papers from schools across Australasia and collated the confidential results. It was a great professional learning opportunity for our teachers in their subject disciplines. We are very fortunate to be able to take part in international professional learning such as this, as we are an accredited AEFE school. Thank you to all our French Binational teachers for their great work and supporting our students to achieve great results.

We are extremely grateful for the support of the Hawthorn Rotary Club who have provided scholarships for some of our students to attend the ConocoPhillips Science experience. The first of these events was held over the July school holidays. Look further on in the newsletter for a more detailed report on our student's experiences.

Finally, I would like to farewell and thank Steve Milward, our Business Manager, who will be leaving the Department of Education and embarking on a new career. Also, I would like to farewell and thank Rhett Jordon, who has picked up a contract at another school. We wish Steve and Rhett all the best and thank them for their great work at our school. ### STEM

#### Holiday homework

This term we will delve into the magical world of space. For their holiday homework, our Year 7 SEAL students were asked to watch all 10 episodes of 'A stargazers guide to the cosmos' available on ABC iView. They then chose their favourite episode to write a about.

#### Episode1 - How to see the Earth turn

This episode was about how Greg Quicke realised that the Earth was spinning and how to see the Earth spinning for yourself. In this episode, I learned about how the Earth spins. All the stars in the sky are fixed in one place, which is why they are called fixed stars. When we see stars at one time in the sky and look at the same set of stars a few hours later, we see the stars have moved. This is due to the Earth turning us. Anything in the eastern sky will appear to rise into the sky at night. Anything in the western sky will appear to go down. For example, the Southern Cross will be in one position during the night, and a few hours later, it will have moved up into the sky.

Everyone knows that the Earth is spinning but being able to physically see the Earth move is what makes it interesting. Having the realisation, being able to turn the knowledge into experience is what makes it interesting. This is important because even though everyone knows that the Earth is spinning, actually being able to witness it makes it more real.

Episode 2 – Navigate by the stars

I've learned a lot about the stars and how to navigate north, south, east and west by using the Southern Cross and the Pointers (Beta Centauri and Alpha Centauri). I learnt the names of the stars in the constellation, which are the Alpha Crucis, the Beta Crucis, the Gamma Crucis, the Delta Crucis and the Epsilon Crucis, which are also letters of the Greek alphabet. Anyway, you can connect the x axis of the Southern Cross and the middle of the Pointers and make two lines, where they connect is the South Celestial Point. Drawing a line down from there, that is the south horizon! This is important and interesting because if you are lost, you have a sense of your surroundings thanks to the stars and you can figure out your way to somewhere helpful.

Episode 10 – See the galaxy and beyond

In the Milky Way alone, there are over 200,000,000,000 solar systems. This is only one galaxy out of many in the universe. To travel all the way through our galaxy, it takes our Solar System 210,000,000 years! There is still so much for us on Earth to discover about space and other galaxies, and one of the ways scientists do that is by studying other galaxies. In 1990, a space shuttle called the Hubble Telescope launched successfully in Florida, United States. This shuttle was a telescope that was put into low orbit of Earth, and was designed to take higher quality pictures of other galaxies. Due to the absence of the atmosphere, the photos taken were much clearer and detailed. In a tiny space of sky, the size of a grain of sand held at arm's length, revealed over 3,000 galaxies! Later on, a new camera was installed on Hubble and the same photo was taken, now revealing over 10,000 galaxies. This was particularly interesting to me, it intrigued me that a piece of sky that small holds over 10,000 galaxies, the universe must contain uncountable amounts of galaxies. It boggles my brain to think of how extraordinary our universe is and that, with the help of higher technology and science, how much we can discover.

### Scienceworks

On Friday our Year 7 students went on an excursion to Scienceworks. This excursion was a great introduction to their current topic of Space Science where the students will explore

how the movement of the Earth and Moon and Sun in relation to each other affect life on Earth. Students explored the permanent exhibitions, Think Beyond and Sportsworks, completing questions in their scavenger hunt booklet that relate to their Year 7 topics of study this year and into Year 8. They also spent time in the Beyond Perception Gallery learning about things that they cannot see such as light, sound and black holes and gravitational waves.



Our students experienced the Moonbase One show in the planetarium which introduced both the phases of the moon and lunar and solar eclipses, they were also treated to a tour of our night sky and a special feature celebrating the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Apollo 11 landing on the Moon.







