### *Outstanding 2019 NAPLAN school data*

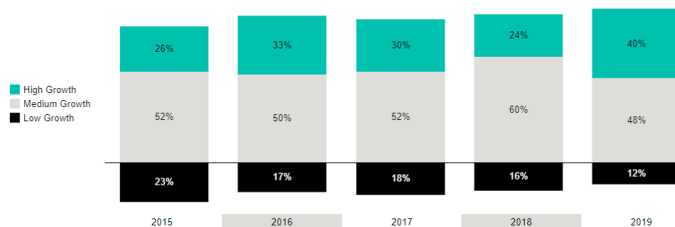
Last week the 2019 NAPLAN results were released to schools. A week earlier, Minister Merlino had announced in the media that Victorian Year 9 data was slightly down. What a delight when we received our data and noticed we did the opposite. Our school actually performed better

than State and our Network (similar schools) in NAPLAN. We also are one of the few schools that had exceptionally high growth of our students from Years 7 to Year 9. These are outstanding results and I congratulate our Year 9 students and their teachers over the past three years for their contribution to these achievements.

For students in Year 9, Numeracy



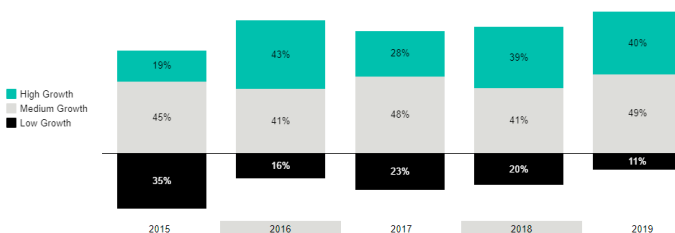
Students by growth category over last 5 years (%)

For students in Year 9, Reading



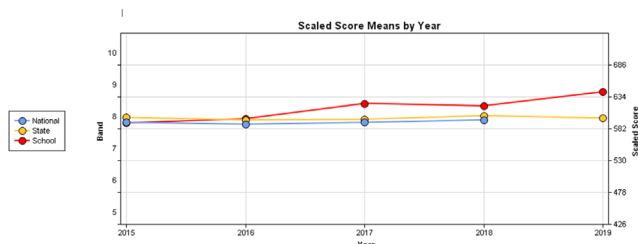

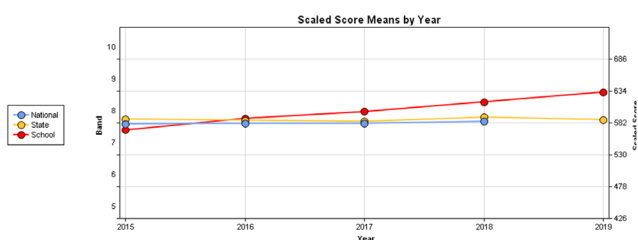

## Auburn High School Basketball Academy - Come and Try sessions now open

## Welcome to our 2020 Year 7 families

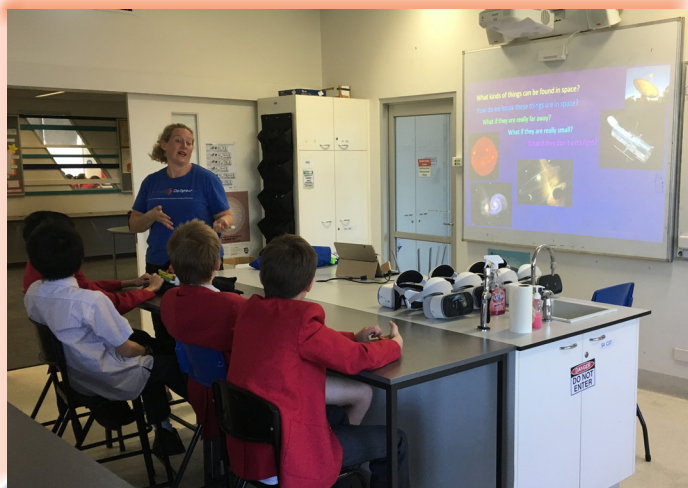
We were pleased to welcome our 2020 Year 7 students and their families last week at the first of our transition events. There was standing room only in the VCE Study Centre as students, parents and carers heard about key information such as devices, camp, course options and our extra-curricular program. It was wonderful to see people chatting with familiar faces and meeting new people over a coffee before and after the presentation. # STEM

## *Scientist wows Year 7s with a black hole of knowledge*

On Tuesday 3rd September 2019, Jackie B from OzGrav showed the year 7 SEAL classes all the wonderful mysteries of space. We used a virtual reality experience to understand how the lifecycle of a star works.



We compared different sizes of stars, and the types of stars as well as visiting virtual planets. We got to interact with a model representing the fabric of space-time; this was a piece of fluoro-green fabric.



Jackie placed a medium sized ball on the fabric to represent a giant object such as a planet, she then rolled a smaller ball past it on the sheet to show how the bigger ball would affect it. The smaller ball curved around the bigger ball which demonstrates how planets orbit other planets and how gravity acts as a force to draw things towards larger objects. We learned about the first recorded gravitational waves that occurred when two black holes collided. We were also shown the machine that detected those gravitational waves, LIGO, and how it worked. LIGO worked by having two four kilometre arms and a laser beam was used to split down the two arms and then reflected back by really heavy mirrors.

When the gravitational waves hit the Earth it changed the length of one arm by a photon so the light from the laser returned to the sensor from each arm at a different speed.

It was such a great experience and we are really grateful to Jackie for coming to visit us.

## *NASA STEM trip - Astrophysicist visit*

After school on Thursday, Dr Andy Casey, an astrophysicist at Monash University, spoke to the G'day Space Program participants, who will be going to NASA in Florida over the school holidays. Andy talked about many different aspects of NASA and space. He told us about the difficult pathway to becoming an astronaut, and that there are currently under 50 astronauts in the world, as well as all the different opportunities there are when studying astrophysics. We learned about the astronauts we were going to meet, as well as their involvement in NASA programs in the past. He also told us an interesting story about the spaceship Columbia; NASA knew that the astronauts were going to die on their descent to earth but didn't tell them.

After Andy's talk, the Auburn and South Oakleigh students were given an engineering challenge. We were asked to build a bridge resembling the Golden Gate Bridge (where we are going) out of spaghetti, tape and wire. The Auburn High and South Oakleigh students worked well together, and we were able to produce some strong bridges, some of which could hold 3 kg (that's impressive for spaghetti). Andy's talk was great, and it was great meeting and working with the South Oakleigh students.

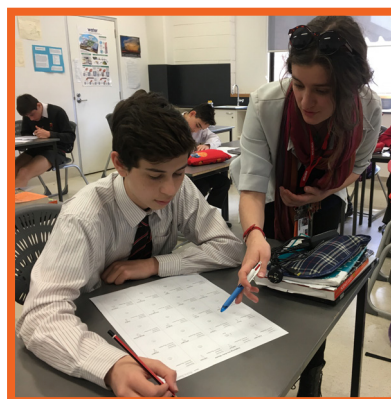
my experience to show the students a different perspective of the STEM world.

**TIMELY VTAC APPLICATIONS** close on 30 September. Once you have created a VTAC account, you can apply for up to eight course choices. Put your favourite course with the highest ATAR as your first choice. If you meet the prerequisites and your ATAR is high enough, you will be offered your first choice on 18 December. **IMPORTANT:** For timely applications the cost will be \$39. **After 30 September the cost goes up to \$119.**

You receive your ATAR on 12 December; you can then change your preferences until 14 December. First round offers this year will be made on 18 December. You will then have another opportunity to change your preferences (18-20 December). Second round offers come out on 15 January.

**ACCEPT YOUR FIRST OFFER**— you can withdraw later if you accept a second round offer or if you wish you can defer your studies.

## Have you ever thought about a career as an ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENTIST?

Environmental Scientists study, develop, implement and advise on policies and plans for managing and protecting the environment, flora, fauna and other natural resources.

Some related jobs include Conservation Officer, Environmental Consultant; Park Ranger; Environmental Educator; Ecologist; Soil Scientist; Water Quality Analyst; Air Pollution Analyst.

You might be responsible for such tasks as

- evaluating habitat, wildlife and fisheries needs, and formulating short- and long-term management goals and objectives
- enforcing laws and regulations to conserve and protect fish and wildlife
- carrying out environmental impact assessments for a wide range of development projects
- studying and analysing pollution, atmospheric conditions, demographic characteristics, ecology, mineral, soil and water samples

To get a job in this field, you would generally need at least a bachelor's degree in Science, Agriculture, Environmental Studies, Biological Sciences, Engineering, Chemistry, Marine Biology, or similar.

You may not have thought of translating or interpreting as a career, but there are many options for people who are multi-lingual. Your language skills will increase your employability and may be the point of difference that makes you the successful applicant for a job in the future. You could consider a career in government, perhaps as an overseas diplomat or a foreign affairs and trade officer, or you might like to study journalism and become an international correspondent. Teaching English (or another language) as a second language may be a good choice, or you might like to work in the field of international aid or development. The Australian Defence Force employ language specialists, for example as foreign language or intelligence analysts. Tour guides, flight attendants, customs and border control, hotel staff, baristas, waitresses, and retail assistants are all more likely to gain employment if they are competent in more than one language. In business, in archaeology and anthropology—whatever the field, having a second language is useful. For example, whether you are a builder, a lawyer, a nurse, or a dentist, the people with whom you work will appreciate your second language skills. Consider including a language course in your future studies.

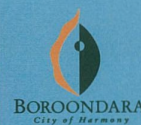

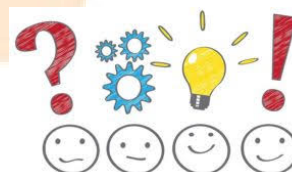
